Another International Sporting Event Adds Para Taekwondo

Para Taekwondo Added to the Virtus Americas Games 2022 in Sao Paulo, Brazil



The list of prestigious international multi-sport events that Para Taekwondo athletes can compete in continues to grow as the Virtus Americas Games added Para Taekwondo to its list of sports at the 2022 edition in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

The Virtus Games are a leader in sport for athletes with an intellectual impairment. Para Poomsae athletes in the P21 and P22 Sport Classes will have the opportunity to test their abilities against the world's top athletes in those disciplines.

Like the Parapan Am Games are to the Paralympics, the Virtus Americas Games are to the Virtus Global Games. The next Virtus Global Games will take place in Vichy, France in June 2023.

Alongside the Virtus Americas Games, other continental championships will take place in Europe (Krakow, Poland in July 2022) and Asia / Oceania (Brisbane, Australia in November 2022). For the moment, Para Taekwondo has yet to be added to those events.

Hosted at the Brazilian Paralympic Centre in Sao Paulo from September 18 - 23, 2022, the event will see athletes from at least 16 nations compete in events like Athletics, Basketball, Futsal, Table Tennis, and Swimming. Organisers hope that hosting the multi-sport, multi-nation event will increase membership in intellectually impaired sport.

Expect registrations to open next year. Until then, you can have your Poomsae athletes assessed for eligibility. Please use the following links for more information.



Register for Bipartite Commission Invitations

for the 2020ne Paralympic Games!



In a sign of Para Taekwondo's imminent Paralympic introduction, the final piece of the Tokyo 2020 qualification process is ready to launch – the Bipartite Commission Invitations (BCIs).

What are Bipartite Commission Invitations (BCIs)?

Awarded after consultation between World Taekwondo and the International Paralympic Committee, BCIs are designed "to ensure participation of top athletes who may not have had the opportunity to formally qualify through other methods due to extraordinary circumstances".

How are BCIs awarded?

BCIs can be awarded based on several criteria (from IPC) which include, but are not limited to:

- Ensuring representation of athletes with high needs;
- Ensuring medal events will have sufficient representation for viability; and/or
- To offer greater representation by gender.

Who is eligible to apply for BCIs?

Any athlete that has not yet qualified for the 2020ne Paralympic Games, meets the eligibility requirements, and wishes to participate in the 20200ne Paralympic Games must apply for a Bipartite Commission Invitation.

Athletes must meet all eligibility requirements by 2 August. Minimum Qualification Standards apply, which include:

- Holding a WT Global Athlete License for 2021
- Being internationally classified in:
 - A 'Confirmed' Sport Class Status (K44 or K43), OR
 - A 'Fixed Review Date' Sport Class Status with a review date after 31-December-2021
- Holding either:
 - A Taekwondo Dan issued by WT/Kukkiwon, OR
 - A MNA-recognised 5-1 Geup
- Being at least 16 years old by 31-December-2021
- Having competed in at least one international, sanctioned competition between 1-January-2018 and 6-June-2021
- · Appearing on the World Para Taekwondo Ranking.

How many BCIs will be awarded?

Para Taekwondo has been awarded at least three BCIs, to be awarded in divisions where no Japanese athlete was entered.

Japan will select athletes in the men's up to 61 kg, men's up to 75 kg, and women's over 58 kg divisions.

This means the one BCI will be awarded to each of the men's over 75 kg, women's under 49 kg, and women's under 58 kg divisions.

BCIs will also be awarded when no athlete qualified via the World Ranking allocation or the Continental Championship route, such as in the men's over 75 kg and women's under 58 kg tournaments in Oceania.

Important: Unlike qualification through the rankings or Continental Qualification Tournaments, BCIs are awarded to individual athletes – NOT National Paralympic Committees (NPCs).

How to apply for BCIs?

MNAs will have to make their application through the NPC. NPCs looking to submit applications for BCIs must apply through the IPC's Sport Data Management System. To do this, follow these steps:

- Log in to https://www.paralympic.org/sdms
 - NOTE: Only NPC 'Primary Users' may submit applications for athletes in sports not governed by the IPC, including Para Taekwondo.
- Click the 'IPC Online Entries System' tab on the main page or from the main menu
- · Click on the 'Applications' icon
 - NOTE: You can register athletes for BCIs from any sport that is open for BCI registration not only Para Taekwondo.
- Select your NPC and fill out your Athlete Registration Form. Select the athlete's sport class and add other necessary information, such as license number. Be sure to save to complete the registration.
- Select the event for which your athlete is applying for a BCI. Be sure to save to complete the event registration.
- Click 'Back to Grid' to open the overview table so that you can see all the athletes for which you have applied for a BCI. Repeat previous steps to apply for each athlete that wishes to apply for a BCI.
- You may add, edit, or delete athletes at any time while the registration window is open.
 - NOTE: You can not edit an athlete's personal information. You will have to delete the athlete
 and add again with the correct information.
- IMPORTANT: Be sure to register any athlete that wants to participate at the 2020ne Paralympic Games and is eligible. This is the final chance for non-qualified athletes to participate!

When to apply for BCIs?


The application for BCIs for Para Taekwondo athletes opens on 10 May at 0:01 Central European Time and closes on 31 May at 23:59 Central European Time.

When will BCIs be awarded?

BCIs will be allocated by 7 June, after which World Taekwondo will inform NPCs of the decisions in writing.

Message from the Para Taekwondo Committee Chairman Chakir Chelbat

Now is the time to get your coaches and classifiers certified!

Your athletes will not be allowed to compete in international, World Taekwondo-sanctioned events if your federation does not have a certified coach!

Already 306 coaches from 149 countries have completed the Level I certification.

There are 154 coaches from 84 countries that have received Level II certification.

There are 210 registered MNAs in World Taekwondo. This means that 61 MNAs will not be able to send athletes to World Taekwondo's international events until they have their coaches certified.

Let's get on it!

At the same time, to facilitate the process of new athletes being internationally classified, it is important for your MNA to certify its own national classifiers.

Currently, 52 classifiers from 30 countries have completed World Taekwondo's Classifier Training Level I. Of these, 35 are technical classifiers and 17 are medical classifiers.

Asia:

Japanese National Team Releases Training Video

Since being awarded the Paralympic Games in 2013, Japan has put significant resources into its Paralympic teams – and the results paid off in 2019 when Japan won its first two World Championships medals, two bronzes in Antalya, Turkey. Expectations are high for the Japanese team and the athletes are enjoying the



limelight. The Japanese National Team recently released a video of the team preparing for the biggest tournament of their lives, where you can see world championship medalists Shunsuke Kudo and Shoko Ota. As Japan's flagbearer at the 2014 Winter Paralympic Games in Sochi, Russia, Ota is already a well-known name and is sure to be one of Japan's star athletes this summer. As host, Japan was awarded three qualification spots and will send athletes in the men's under 61 kg division, the men's under 75 kg division, and the women's over 58 kg division.

Africa:

Rwanda's Niringiyimana Named Paralympic Games Substitute

Rwandan star Jean Claude Niringiyimana was named Africa's official substitute in the men's up to 61 kg division at this summer's Paralympic Games after finishing second at last year's African Paralympic Qualification tournament. The IPC named Niringiyimana the Allianz Athlete of the Month in April 2017 after he helped host Rwanda win six medals to finish second overall at the 2017 African Open championships. The top ranked fighter heading into the qualification tournament, he was upset in a highly entertaining 41-31 loss to Egypt's Mohammed Yasser in the final. Should Yasser not be able to compete this summer (and Egypt can not find an eligible replacement), Niringiyimana will be first in line as the replacement.

Europe

Azerbaijan's Mammadova Wins Another National Award

Accolades keep pouring in for our Para Taekwondo stars and Azerbaijan's Aynur Mammadova was the latest to be recognised. The two-time world champion and four-time European champion was awarded an honorary decree by the Government of Azerbaijan for her successes on the international stage. The former No. 1 ranked fighter in the world was given the award by Adil Aliyev, the Chairman of the Youth and Sports Committee of the Azerbaijani government. Mammadova was named Azerbaijan's top Paralympic athlete in 2019 after picking up her fourth European title. However, a devastating 4-3 quarterfinal loss to Uzbekistan's Guljonoy Naimova at the 2019 World Championships means she missed out on qualifying for Tokyo 202One through the rankings. One of the sport's first stars, No. 6-ranked



Mammadova will now need to win at the all-or-nothing European Paralympic Qualification tournament in May if she hopes to represent Azerbaijan at this summer's Paralympic tournament.



France's Para Taekwondo Team Meets With Japanese Ambassador

In a meeting of the next two Paralympic hosts, Japan's Ambassador to France, Mr. Junichi Ihara, visited the French INSPE Paralympic Centre in Paris to meet with the Paralympic Committee of French Sport and members of France's Para Taekwondo team. The Ambassador met with Committee President and Paralympic champion (Athletics) Marie Amelie Le Fur, France's four-time Para Taekwondo world champion Bopha Kong, and his coach Oury Sztantman. One of Para Taekwondo's earliest stars, Kong has medalled at all eight Para Taekwondo World Championships, winning his fourth gold medal in Antalya, Turkey in 2019.

British World Champion Matt Bush Featured in BBC Profile

Great Britain's state broadcaster – the BBC – published a feature piece on Britain's reigning world champion Matt Bush last month. Titled 'Matt Bush: Meet Britain's first Para Taekwondo world champion'**, the article details Bush's journey on the way to becoming a Para Taekwondo world champion. A star athlete in athletics, he was expecting to compete for Britain at the 2016 Paralympic Games in javelin and shot put before a shoulder



injury ruled him out. After trying a few sports he discovered taekwondo and, as the article points out, it was trial by fire: "Within about three weeks, we were in Korea fighting against the No. 1 guy in my category – It was my first [taekwondo] fight ever." Just two years later he found himself on top of the world championship podium. Still, inconsistent results following that remarkable achievement meant he missed out on automatic Paralympic qualification through the rankings and is now one of the biggest names to watch at the European Paralympic Qualification tournament in May.

Russia 'Returns to Play' With National Championships

In a sign that competitions are readying to return, Russia hosted the National Para Taekwondo Championships in Nalchik last month. More than 80 fighters competed in both kyorugi and poomsae categories. In his first tournament, Ruslan Vakhitov topped three more experienced fighters in the up to 75 kg division, complicating the decision Russia will have to make as to whom to send to this summer's Paralympic Games. Also in the up to 75 kg division are No. 3-ranked Magomedzagir Isaldibirov and No. 4-ranked Vladimir Feofanov – both former European champions (Isaldibirov also has a world championship). Fighters from Russia will compete under the Paralympic banner at the Tokyo 2020ne Games as Russian

athletes are forbidden from competing for Russia as outlined by the World Anti-Doping Committee as punishment for Russia's state-sponsored doping scandal.

Pan Am:

Argentina's Para Taekwondo Team Featured on State Broadcaster

Argentina's Television Publico – South America's oldest public TV station – featured Argentina's Para Taekwondo team last month. The public broadcaster interviewed, Gabriel Taraburelli, the coordinator of the National Team, on how its athletes are preparing for the



Olympic and Paralympic Games. Included in the segment is an interview with Juan Eduardo Samorano, who booked his spot at Tokyo 2020ne with a thrilling 16-14 comeback win over Cuba's Adrian Garcia Rodriguez at the Pan American Paralympic Qualification tournament last year. Already ranked No. 28 in the world after competing in just two ranked tournaments, the young fighter snatched gold at his very first tournament – the 2019 Parapan Am Games qualifier in Dominican Republic and followed it up with a bronze at the Lima 2019 Parapan Am Games.
